Regina Healy & Dodie Liebler

Regina and Dodie moved to our neighborhood in December, 2012 from Freeport, NY, after a harrowing experience living through the aftermath of hurricane Sandy last Fall.

Regina worked for the telephone company for approximately 25 years and was able to "retire young" after being offered a buyout she couldn't refuse. She spent several years as a caregiver for her parents, sharing the duties with her sisters. Regina is one of 6 children and has "loads of nieces and nephews". It was at the phone company that she met Linda Robbins, now one of our Four Seasons residents, and they became close friends.

Dodie spent 41 years in the transportation side of the Freeport school system. After a few years driving the bus for special needs children, she moved to the safety department and trained new drivers and spent time as a manager. Dodie's daughter and two grandchildren are in New York, but she enjoys frequent visits with them

When Regina bought her home in Freeport, a co-worker told her that his daughter lived right across from her. This is how she met Dodie, and they became immediate friends. As Dodie says, it was like Regina and her family "adopted" her. Eventually, with real estate taxes getting so high, Dodie and Regina realized they would both be better off financially if they shared a home. So Regina moved into Dodie's home while getting her home ready to sell. Her house sold in September of 2012. They had no idea how timely this was since a month later they were hit with Hurricane Sandy.

Knowing that they wanted to relocate when Dodie retired, they had been looking at places in North Carolina. But when Harold and Linda Robbins moved here to Four Seasons, they came for a visit and fell in love with the area and our neighborhood. They looked at the houses that were for sale at the time but couldn't find one that was right for them.

In the meantime, Harold knew that David and Mary Wrighte still wanted to sell their home even though they had taken it off the market. So he talked to David and put him in touch with Dodie and Regina. They looked at the house and immediately fell in love with it and reached an agreement with the Wrightes. As they say, timing is everything, because it was shortly after this that Sandy struck Freeport.

After living through Hurricane Irene a year earlier without evacuating, Dodie and Regina trusted the forecasters. When they said Sandy would be worse than Irene, with expected storm surge of 6-8', they took their advice and evacuated. They went to Regina's sister's house where they ended up staying until the move here. The next day, Dodie talked to a neighbor who had not evacuated and she told her the water was 4' high outside and up to a foot inside. Hearing this, they knew that had to go survey the damage and see what could be salvaged.

When they got to their neighborhood they were shocked by the devastation and destruction, both saying it was indescribable. They entered the house and knew right away that they had to start ripping everything out. So they started with the carpet and then tore out the plaster board. Even though it was extremely cold and very depressing, Dodie says she assumes their "adrenaline must have kicked in" because they accomplished more than they could have imagined. She went on to say that even after realizing the home she had lived in since she was three years old was ruined, the thing that had the biggest impact on her and hurt the most was standing in a line for food being provided by the Salvation Army, saying "that is when the reality of the situation really hit me".

Regina recalls how angry she got when cars full of "gawkers" started driving down the street and taking pictures – not even asking if they could help or if the residents needed anything. Normally a mild mannered person – she got so angry that she says she "just lost it" – even shocking her neighbors. She didn't realize until then how much the stress she was under had affected her, saying she must have reached her "breaking point". Of course, there were a lot of people that reached out and helped, and still are. They returned to the area recently and said it is starting to show signs of coming back. There are even hopes of a neighborhood block party in the late summer.

Regina and Dodie have happily settled into their new Four Seasons neighborhood. Regina loves to read and bake and Dodie loves to garden. They both enjoy traveling and have taken many trips together; they plan many more. Dodie describes herself as being a "country girl at heart". She says that after living in the city all of her life, moving into their home here with the park-like setting in their back yard makes her feel like she has "won the lottery". They both say that going through Sandy causes you to change your perspective on life and what truly matters. Just enjoying the peace and quiet here and watching the birds and wildlife that show up in their back yard is all they need. They also appreciate the sense of community here and have felt very welcomed by their neighbors. And of course, being so close to Harold and Linda Robbins is an added bonus.

Welcome to our community, Dodie and Regina!

The Ragged Ramblers: A Brief History

What is sweet **Sue Campbell** doing in a band like this—the infamous **Ragged Ramblers** of Four Seasons? We want to put your curiosity to rest. Here is the story about how this band came to be.

It's September 2012, and **Joe Brennan** is soon to return from his usual summer sojourn in Maine, where he plays acoustic guitar and sings folk songs in a local band and also does solo gigs. Awaiting Joe's return is **Doug Miller**, who started playing guitar some 50 years ago. Doug is a member of *The Gents*, a rock and roll band formed by Doug and some buddies back in his Coast Guard days, and which is still active today, even playing for an annual Third Thirsty Thursday (TTT) here at Four Seasons.

When Joe is in town, he and Doug like to get together for a weekly jam session. These jam sessions began after a chance meeting in December 2010. Joe was newly arrived at Four Seasons, and he had arranged to offer a Christmas sing- along for Four Seasons residents in the Clubhouse. While he was setting up for the event, Doug came over and offered to join him in providing the music for the sing-along. Joe readily agreed, and Doug went home and got his guitar. The event seemed to go well, so the two of them started to get together regularly. They continued through 2011 and the early months of 2012, interrupted by Joe's April-October stay in Maine each year.

In September 2012, **Terry Pratt** is newly arrived at Four Seasons. He took up electric bass guitar about four years earlier, partly in hopes that he might someday stumble upon a band that needed a bass player and that would let an old guy stand in the back and play bass. After Doug's band plays for the September TTT, Terry and Doug have a brief conversation about music at the weekly Gent's Coffee, and Doug invites Terry to sit in on the jam sessions when Joe Brennan returns in a few weeks.

At that first jam session, in the Clubhouse card room, **Joe Tucker**, also a recent arrival at Four Seasons, happens to wander by, sees the jam session going on, and

sticks his head in the door to inquire about it. To the group's delight, Joe turns out to be a professional musician and music teacher who can play multiple instruments. He wants to learn the banjo, so the next week he joins the jam session as the banjo player, although he admits that he also could play piano, bass, drums, vibraphone, or almost anything else if needed.

Terry has never played in a group before, nor in public, so he is pretty skittish, especially because Joe Brennan, Doug, and Joe Tucker are all experienced professionals or semi-professionals. He withdraws briefly, but Joe Tucker coaxes him back in November. By that time news of the jam sessions has spread at Four Seasons, and there is an invitation to play some holiday music for upcoming events at the Clubhouse.

Joe Brennan is a seasoned lead singer, but Doug has never sung with his band, Terry has never sung in public, and Joe Tucker has only sung occasionally. Now everybody is expected to sing. It's quite a stretch for the group.

But help is on the way! The initial group of four plays at two holiday music sing-alongs in December. And **Sue Campbell**, with a background in choral music and barbershop, expresses interest in singing with the group. In January, she joins the weekly jam sessions as a singer. She is sorely needed, because the group has invitations to play for the February "Meet & Eat" and the St. Patrick's Day TTT in March. The March gig is especially tough, because Joe Brennan brings forth about 20 Irish folk songs, most of which no one else in the band has ever played before. Lots of hard work learning the lyrics and music follows, but the St. Patrick's Day gig is a success.

And the saga continues—another Meet & Eat in April, and another TTT in June. Joe Brennan returns to Maine for the summer, so the group dwindles and loses its lead singer. But the weekly jam sessions continue — because all in the band love making music together and learning new tunes. And it's just icing on the cake to be invited to play for social gatherings at Four Seasons. Thanks from all in the band to you, our great audience!

Jim and I enjoyed a marvelous cruise recently that began as a "repositioning cruise" from Florida to Europe and extended into a wonderful tour of Northern European ports and cities. We'd like to share some of our travel notes with our friends in Four Seasons.

Ft. Lauderdale to Ireland. Leaving from Ft. Lauderdale on April 26, we sailed for Europe. After six days at sea we were supposed to stop in Pont Delgada, Portugal, but the seas and wind were so bad we could not stop in that port. That meant three more days at sea before we docked in Cobh, Ireland, a beautiful small Irish town, where we enjoyed an excursion to the Blarney Castle.

England, Normandy, back to England. After our day in Ireland we were off to Falmouth, England, where we visited the area of Cornwall. Our next port was Le Havre, France, and we did an excursion to the Beaches of Normandy. It was a place of such beauty and a very humbling experience to visit an area where so many of our men died so long ago. From France we were off to Dover, England, with a side trip to London. It was a bus trip from the port of Dover to London. The traffic was horrible, but we did see Buckingham Palace and many of the other highlights of the city.

Netherlands, **Denmark**. From Dover, the next day was spent in Rotterdam, Netherlands. While in Rotterdam we took an excursion to the beautiful town of Delft, which included a tour through the Delft factory. There we saw some of the beautiful hand-painted Royal Delftware, which is very expensive! After Rotterdam we had a relaxing day at sea and then docked in Copenhagen, Denmark, where we enjoyed a canal cruise of the highlights of Copenhagen.

Norway, Denmark again, Germany. The second part of our cruise was very busy. After one day in Copenhagen,

nedy stayed there when he was in Germany and gave his famous speech. After a long day in Berlin followed by our train ride back to the port, we had a relaxing day at sea while on our way to Tallin, Estonia.

Estonia, **Russia**. Tallin is a beautiful old European city. We took a five hour walking trip throughout the city, up and down the cobblestone streets and loved every minute of it. From Tallin we were off to St. Petersburg, Russia. Our ship had an overnight in St. Petersburg so we had two very full days of sight-seeing while there. We visited the grand and very beautiful Hermitage Museum. We walked

Zucchini Oven Chips

Zucchini is in abundance during the summer months. These breaded, oven-fried zucchini chips taste like they are fried, yet they are baked and amazingly crispy. These chips make a healthy substitute for French fries or potato chips.

Ingredients:

1/4 cup dry breadcrumbs

1/4 cup (1 ounce) grated fresh Parmesan cheese

1/4 teaspoon seasoned salt

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

2 tablespoons fat-free milk

2 1/2 cups (1/4 inch thick) sliced zucchini (about 2 small)

Cooking spray

Preparation:

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Combine first 5 ingredients in a medium bowl, stirring with a whisk. Place milk in a shallow bowl. Dip zucchini slices in milk, and dredge in breadcrumbs mixture. Place coated slices on an ovenproof wire rack coated with cooking spray; place rack on a baking sheet. Bake at 425 degrees for 30 minutes or until browned and crisp. Serve immediately.
