~ Meet Your Neighbors ~
Peter and Felicity Bowles

Four Seasons residents come from a wide range of places and backgrounds, and there are many interesting personal stories to be told. The story of **Peter and Felicity Bowles**, and their long journey from their home in Africa to Four Seasons, ranks among the best. But it is a story of violence and terror that few of us can imagine.

Both Felicity and Peter were born in Africa; Peter a first-generation Rhodesian, and Felicity a fourth-generation South African.



They met in England. Peter was there to study farming and was dating a friend of Felicity's. Felicity was a young nurse in Salisbury, Rhodesia. Felicity and her friend took a ship to England to start a ski vacation to Austria with Peter. On the voyage, her friend met a new guy that she liked better than Peter, and in England, Felicity met Peter for the first time. It must have been love at first sight, because five weeks later they were engaged! They married in 1966.

They both loved Rhodesia and in 1968 they bought a large farm about 110 miles north of the capital out in the "bush". Peter was a skilled farmer and the farm prospered. They settled in and started a family. But the political situation in the country became increasingly unstable. It was the time of the breakup of colonial empires in Africa, and each African country took a different path. In Rhodesia, the country declared its independence from Britain in 1965, but with the colonial government still in control. Marxist guerilla forces soon organized and a struggle for control of the country began. 1969 saw the beginning of terrorist attacks, targeting the outlying farms in rural areas first.

In the ensuing 10 years, the violence slowly increased. Peter and Felicity and their family and farm were targeted by the terrorists. A security fence had to be built to surround their home and outbuildings. They were forced to carry weapons and have them always at their sides. Peter had to serve two weeks of every month in the police reserve force, which was the first line of defense against any terrorist attack. While Peter was away on duty, Felicity and the children had to spend every night at a neighbor's house because it was never safe for a woman and children to be alone at night in their home.

In 1978 they took a long trip to visit Peter's brother who had immigrated to the U.S. When they returned, they were told that they were on the "hit list" of the terrorists, and they were assigned a squad of four bodyguards who had to stay near them at all times.

This frightening situation came to a head on Oct. 28, 1978, which happened to be Peter's birthday. Instead of cake and ice cream, the terrorists attacked with mortars, rocket-propelled grenades, and machine guns from outside the security fence. The three older children were at boarding schools, but the youngest, Sarah, was there. Their memories are still vivid of that night. After a thirty-minute firefight with the terrorists, Peter fired a grenade and finally the attack broke

off. The house was severely damaged, but the three of them were safe and uninjured.

They knew that if they stayed, the attacks would just continue; there was little choice but to move. They leased their farm and moved out of the country, first to neighboring Malawi which was encouraging farmers to emigrate there, and then, at the end of 1980 after they had received their green cards, to the U.S.

Peter and Felicity arrived in the northern Virginia area with \$700 in their bank account, four kids, and no jobs. Their furniture was still in storage in Africa and wouldn't arrive for another three months. And although they were only in their 40's, they had already experienced enough for more than one lifetime.

Resilient might be a good word to describe Peter and Felicity. After all the trauma and dislocation, they quickly recovered and put down roots in their new homeland. Peter found a short-term job as manager of a Christmas tree farm, and then, by networking with his neighbors, joined a new hydroponic vegetable-growing startup. It was hugely successful and soon was sending ten thousand head of lettuce a week to Giant and Safeway groceries, plus cucumbers, and tomatoes. But the business turned out to be too labor intensive, and it couldn't be sustained.

Peter moved on to become a leading sales agent for the Tysons Corner Mercedes/Audi/Porsche/LandRover dealer, and ranked near the top nationally in Audi and Land Rover sales. In 1985, Felicity went to work at the airlines and ended up working for United, with a long stint in a fascinating position as the concierge of the first-class international lounge at Dulles.

After retirement and a knee operation which left Peter unable to walk for eight months, they began to look for an alternative to their multi-story townhouse near Purcellville. On-line, they saw information about Four Seasons, came to take a look, and left with a contract for a new home.

Felicity tells of her tenth grandchild, recently arrived. She also says how grateful she feels to even be alive after their horrendous experiences in Africa, and she adds "I hate guns; I never want to have one in my home again." An easy feeling to understand!

Mary Ann Goes on Safari

Safari 2013

I had a safari on my bucket list for quite some time and in October of 2013 I was able to check that one off. I joined a group of eleven other people, none of whom I knew, and went off to South Africa. We did get together a few times beforehand to plan the additional trip to Cape Town that was to follow after the safari so we weren't complete strangers at the start of the adventure!

Meeting at the gate in Dulles we started the seventeen hour flight to the Johannesburg airport

where we were met by our guide Joe Viljoen and one of his sons Zen. We then took the hour and a half ride to their 40,000 acre

wildlife ranch, ChaZen (named after Joe's sons Micha and Zen), and settled in.

The ranch is located in an interesting geological region called the Vredefort Dome which was formed by a massive meteorite impact more than 2,000 million years ago. This would be our base for the start of the safari and then the end of it.

Game drives here were an opportunity to experience ChaZen's diverse wildlife which includes Giraffe, Cape Buffalo, Zebra, both Blue and Black Wildebeests, and much of the antelope family, including Eland, Kudu, Nyala, Impala, Waterbuck Blesbok (including rare white Blesbok), both Gray and Mountain Rhebok, Tsessebe, Springbok, Red Hartebeest, Red Duiker, the rare Roan Antelope. Also a large vari-



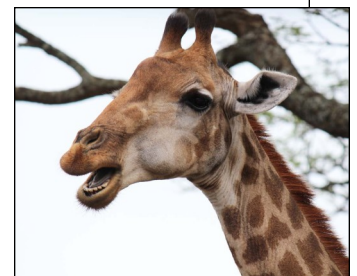
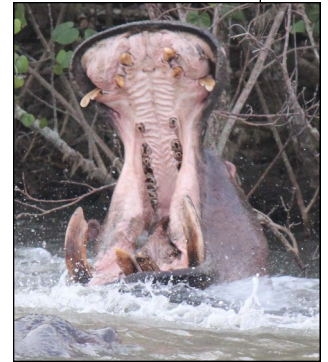
ety of birds were present including Ostrich. Where there are birds of course there are cats...Caracals, Serval, Genet, African Black-footed cat, Leopards and Lions, Oh My!!!

But our safari experience was not limited to ChaZen. We went on to explore an area of South Africa known as Kwazulu-Natal. This included visiting the Pangola Game Reserve (Elephants!!!), the Hluhluwe-Umfolozi Game Reserve (largest population of white rhino), St.

Lucia and the Indian Ocean, the Zulu Cultural Village and enjoying what they all had to offer, including sundown cruises to see hippos and other animals gathering at the water's edge in the evening.

Let's also not overlook the shopping opportunities we had. There were many markets, outdoor and otherwise as well as a trip to a wonderful jewelry shop. Tanzanite, diamonds and gold all at wonderful prices and duty free!!!!

All-in-all it was a wonderful trip, and I'll be returning in late April to safari in Botswana and Namibia as well as a visit to Victoria Falls which will be led again by Joe Viljoen.

Photography Club Has First Meeting

Dave Katz has taken the initiative to organize a Four Seasons Photography Club. The first meeting was held on February 26, and a regular meeting date of the third Wednesday of every month was set. There was a nice turnout, as about a dozen Four Seasons residents attended, including some with extensive photography experience and others just learning their way around all the technology of digital cameras.

Garden Talk

Japanese Beetles

Beneath the soil in your yard and mine there is a life cycle going on which (when complete) can devastate grasses, garden plants, and particularly roses. By understanding the timing of the cycle, devastation can be reduced or eliminated by application of control products.

Late last summer (August) the **Japanese Beetle** that munched on your roses and other flowers, laid it's eggs in the soil. The eggs hatch into larvae which move deep into the soil where they winter over as white grubs.

As the ground begins to warm in March they move upward and feed on plant roots (dead grass patches in your lawn). By late May or early summer they surface and become the dreaded Japanese Beetle.

To control the grubs before they emerge and transform themselves into beetles, you need to start early. Between April 15 and May 15, try Scotts Grub-Ex. From late May into mid-July, there are four products on the recommended list. See the table in the next column.

In order to control Japanese Beetles during mid through late summer, use a topical insecticide on plants and areas of known infestation. NEED OIL causes insects to slow down or stop eating. Other sprays include liquid SEVIN, Sevin dust and Rotenone. In granular form is TRIAZICIDE (made by Spectricide) which is applied one time per year.

Also during this time frame, beetle traps can be set. They will work if the traps are set far away from the area you are trying to protect. The beetles are attracted to the traps and are unable to get out, thus less eggs laid in your lawn.

Late August through September, apply a lawn pesticide while grubs are young. MILKY SPORE is a natural fungicide that attacks and kills the grubs over a number of years. BAYER ADVANCED GRUB CONTROL is another effective product.

**Mail Theft: A Word of Warning from Another Four Seasons**

The **Four Seasons at Historic Virginia** community in the Lorton-Quantico area off of I-95 recently posted this notice to their residents. Definitely something to consider when you are mailing anything that contains a check or other financial or personal information. We are not aware of any mail thefts at our Four Seasons.

“Several active adult communities in the Maryland-Northern Virginia area have recently been targeted by mail thieves who are stealing checks from outgoing mail. The thieves target mailboxes with the red flag raised. Some Four Seasons (*at Historic Virginia*) residents have reported incidents to the police and the US Postal Inspector. To protect your mail and your checking account, the Association Board of Directors and the Management team recommend:

- When at all possible, use electronic banking to pay your bills.
- If you need to send valuable mail and can't take it to an outside drop box, it is suggested that you look for the mail delivery person and hand it to them.
- If you see someone tampering with a mailbox, get the license plate number and a description of the vehicle and report it to the US Postal Inspector Fraud Dept. at 1-877-876-2455.”

This is contrary to the Covenants section 10.17: Trash Containers and Collection ... In no event shall such containers be maintained so as to be visible from outside the principal structure on a Dwelling Unit unless they are being made available for collection and then *only for the shortest time reasonably necessary to effect such collection.*

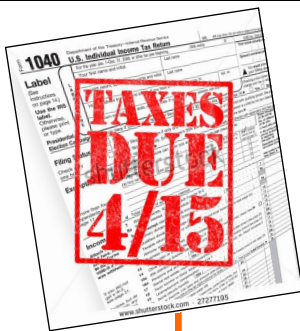
