~ Meet your Neighbors~

Fred and June's story began in Freeport, Illinois in 1966. As June relates the story, she had invited a friend from church to go to a newly organized Parents Without Partners meeting. There were about 16 people in attendance but only two men, and Fred was one of them. At the conclusion of the meeting they set up a picnic for the following Sunday for everyone to bring their children. They were also asked to share any plans they had for the summer and June said she

was preparing for a two week camping trip to Colorado.

At the picnic the following week, one of the men sat with June during lunch. He told her he was from Colorado and they discussed her upcoming camping trip. After lunch, he got up to play ball with one of June's sons. Fred, arriving late, sat down next to June. As it turns out, he was also from Colorado! They talked all afternoon and Fred joined June at the band concert in the park that evening where June's daughters were performing.

June received a note from Fred a few days later saying how much he enjoyed her company and the concert. So June called Fred telling him that it was her birthday and what a wonderful surprise the note was. Fred invited June and her children over for a picnic, but June declined because her brother and family were visiting. But Fred was not to be deterred. Instead, he invited them to Rockford, IL (about 30 miles away) to see the Sound of Music.

Shelby, seeing romance in the works, offered to babysit the boys, so June accepted the invitation. June, accompanied by her other daughters, went on her first "official" date with Fred, accompanied by his son and daughter. From that point on, June says Fred went "all out" courting her. Coming over every night and weekend and helping her boys build a camp cupboard and a heavy box for the top of the car as they prepared for their camping trip to Colorado. The morning of their trip, Fred brought June a special lantern/light that his company had developed.

Fred sent June a telegram while they were in Denver, then proposed to her on the sidewalk outside her house the morning they returned. At first June didn't accept. She said since she was raising 3 daughters and 3 sons, she didn't feel this was the proper way to teach them. However, Fred persisted, coming over every night, going on walks, etc. He told June that she either knew, or she didn't, but he did! Come to find out, the main reason he wanted to expedite the wedding was he was scheduled for a sales/business trip to New York City, Canada, and Niagara Falls. So they were married Sept. 24, 1966, just 8 weeks after they met. June says "for a girl who had never been further than Chicago, the trip was fantastic!"

As it turns out, Fred had taught Sunday School to two of June's daughters, and they had been trying to get her to

meet him. But June didn't want anything to do with another man to "train and raise" - being too busy already as a single mom with 6 children and working 3 jobs. (Her daughters were obviously right – wouldn't you say?). And Fred's son and daughter were very thrilled to join another family. On the whole, the two families were excited and happy about the merger. As June says, "it took a lot of work, but they

made it".

Their early married life took them from Illinois to Sheboygan, Wisconsin, where they lived and raised their family until 1970. That year, they moved to Nelson County, Virginia, purchased 35 acres, and built a home on the property (they also bought the Packing Shed Antique Mall that some of you may be familiar with).

Fred used his engineering skills and experience to start the F. R. Drake Company in 1979, manufacturing parts for the meat processing industry. He and June worked out of the 4,000 sq.ft. garage that Fred added to their house. In 1983, Fred was contacted by Peter Eckrich of the Eckrich Meat Company (now a part of Smithfield Foods). Peter knew of Fred's talents and abilities and wanted Fred to design and build a loading system for hot dogs. In 1984, Fred completed the design and development of the first Drake Loader. The machine offered superior technical features over other hotdog loading systems: it loaded 25% faster (up to 1,800 pieces/minute), required up to 50% less floor space, and used "first-in, first-out" handling to reduce bacteria and improve shelf life. And, like Fred, built to last!

There were some challenging early years, as with any new company, but F.R. Drake Company eventually became a huge success. The F. R. Drake Company has needed to expand several times, so the company now operates out of a 32,000 sq.ft. facility in Waynesboro. June's son, Gregg, is still involved with Drake as a senior controls engineer, having joined the firm in 1986. He is one of about 80 skilled engineers, machinists, assemblers, salespeople, and office personnel who are employed by the company. Drake Loaders are in operation in over 30 countries and the company commands a 97% global market share. F.R. Drake Company was purchased in 2011 by the Middleby Corporation, a company that posted sales of \$1.4 billion in 2013. June is proud of Fred's many accomplishments, saying that even after Fred retired at 70 he decided to get his contractor's license and designed and built houses! But she is most proud of the results of their "merger" -12 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren – and 46+ wonderful years together.


~ Landscaping & Grounds Committee ~



Betty Ray's Brother Appears in New Movie

Dr. James Litton, brother of Betty Ray and a frequent visitor to Four Seasons, has a cameo role in a new movie, Boychoir, scheduled to premier this year, starring Dustin Hoffman, Kathy Bates, Sissy Spacek, and Debra Winger. Jim Litton is an internationally recognized organist and choral conductor, former Director of the American Boychoir, now Conductor of the Alumni Choir and Music Director Emeritus of the American Boychoir.



The plot of the movie is about an angry elevenyear-old orphan from a small Texas town who ends up at a boy choir school (fashioned after the American Boychoir in Princeton, New Jersey) after the death of his single mom. Completely out of his element, he finds himself in a battle of wills with a demanding choir master who recognizes a unique talent in the young boy as he pushes him to discover his creative heart and soul in music. Dustin Hoffman is playing the Director of the American Boychoir.

Francois Girard, the Academy Award Director of *The Red Violin* and Cirque du Soleil's *ZED and Zarkana*, is the director of *Boychoir*. Serving as Music Director for this film is Jim Litton's successor, Fernando Malvar-Ruiz. All the music will be performed by the boys from the American Boychoir. Girard commented, "These boys' voices soar with this rare unearthly ability for only a few years of their young lives (4th through 8th grade), but what they experience in that brief time shapes them forever."

Hoffman and Girard visited the American Boychoir campus to meet and work with the boy choristers and staff before the filming began in March. Betty said that her brother Jim enjoyed being on the film set, which was at Yale and also in New York City. He enjoyed meeting Dustin Hoffman and Francois Girard

and said they were delightful, and Dustin entertained the crew by playing the piano.

Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)

CERT consists of volunteers who have been trained to handle various emergencies by qualified health and disaster personnel. In Greene County, we are activated only by the Sheriff's Office, but can fill any role for which we are trained and where our assistance is needed.

Trained CERT members fill a

vital role in the moments immediately following an emergency before first responders arrive on scene. Training involves basic disaster preparedness, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, triage and first



aid, disaster psychology and terrorism awareness. CERT members also support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community, both in spreading the word about preparedness and in assisting agencies during response operations.

A new training class is being pre-

ings. Lots of fresh fruits and vegetables are available, as well as fresh flowers, baked goods, herbs, cheeses, crafts, doughnuts made on the spot, live music, and much more. City Market runs every Saturday morning all through the summer. There is parking in the Water St. parking garage and on the streets nearby. Definitely worth a trip!

8:30pm, the Charlottesville Pavilion, located at the East end of the downtown mall, hosts a FREE concert showcasing local and regional talent.
