

### Annual Meeting and Board Election on Sept. 17

Because Four Seasons at Charlottesville Community Association, Inc. is a corporation, a Board of Directors comprised of elected members of the corporation administers its affairs. In accordance with the documents governing the HOA, the election of directors for 2016-2018 will take place at the Annual Meeting of Membership on Saturday, September 17, 2016 at 11:00 a.m. at the Clubhouse. Check-in begins at 10:30 a.m.

Every owner of a lot in Four Seasons is a member of the association, and all members are eligible to vote. All members are welcome and encouraged to attend the meeting in person. If you are unable to attend, however, please complete the blue proxy form you were sent recently so that your vote will be counted.

Five members have been nominated to fill the three board positions up for election at the meeting. During the meeting, nominations will also be taken from the floor. Directors serve a two-year term. Each lot within Phase I is entitled to one (1) vote for each of the board positions up for election. Cumulative voting is NOT permitted. You may vote for up to three candidates, but you may not vote more than once for a single candidate.

## Beware of Telephone Scam!

If you receive a telephone call from someone claiming to be from the Department of the Treasury or claiming there is pending litigation against you, give them no information.



Get their phone number, or if they leave a message, check to see the number they are calling from. Then go to the following website to fill in an incident report.

The government is trying to narrow down the sources of these calls. It takes less than five minutes to enter the requested information.

#### Is Your ICE Up To Date?

Speaking of phones, do you have emergency contact information entered in your iPhone's address book? If so, you might want to add this information to your iPhone's lock screen so first responders can get this info easily. About 10 years ago, first responders, like paramedics and fire fighters, started to encourage everybody to add a record to their cell phone's address book titled ICE. ICE stands for In Case of Emergency. Your ICE record should list contact information of your next of kin so first responders can contact them. If your iPhone is locked with a passcode, then your address book would likely be inaccessible by first responders. Thus, it's recommended that you put your ICE info on your iPhone's lock screen.

### Support the Troops and Wounded Warríors: It's What We Do!



## Caring Hands Team Presentation on September 16!

Caring Hands is a group of volunteers whose mission is to help our neighbors—on a temporary basis—when they are ill or alone or in personal need. The team helps to provide transportation (with 48 hours notice); run errands such as pick up groceries; pet care walking your dog and checking in on them; provide a meal when needed; and visit folks who are housebound. What they cannot do is provide home nursing care; dispense medications; house cleaning services; or meals on a regular basis.

Chris Sauter, who is its current chairperson, formed this caring group. When she moved here several years ago, Chris began looking for volunteer opportunities. While there were quite a few to choose from, she had something else in mind.

She realized there wasn't anything in place to help neighbors as they grew older and were faced with issues that went along with aging. After all, she reflected, "None of us are getting any younger." She put the word out and got a huge response. Today the Caring Hands team consists of over a dozen men and women.

In addition to the services they provide, Chris said the team sends get well cards to people in the hospital or recuperating and keeps a list of outside agencies that can take over the responsibilities that Caring Hands cannot do. That list is contained in the Caring Hands folder at the front desk in the clubhouse.

Caring Hands has a number of adaptive devices that are available on a loan basis. These include: walkers, commode, toilet set bars; transfer bench shower chair; accessory for hair washing; 911 First Alert with spare battery; transfer belts; sliding boards; raised toilet seat with hand supports and two wheelchairs.



Speaking on behalf of the group, Chris reflected on why people sign up for this particular team.

"They feel good about helping their neighbors," she said. "I think the fact that we have a team in place means people can call someone on the team rather than solely relying on their friends. This is a small community and people have always helped each other. As needs became greater, we have agencies that can come in. We are lucky we are in the Charlottesville area and that we have these good services."

To introduce you to this wonderful service, the Four Seasons Caring Hands Team will make a presentation on Friday, September 16 at 1:00 p.m. in the ballroom of the clubhouse. They will introduce their team of volunteers who help neighbors in need, explain their services, answer questions and accept new volunteers.

Coffee and cake will be served and handouts, which give more information, will be available.

#### **DISASTER CHEAT SHEET**

Four Seasons Residents What we need to know in the midst of chaos.



Move valuables to higher floors if there's time before you leave. Shut off power at the main switches and disconnect appliances, but never touch electrical equipment if you're wet or standing in water. Never walk through moving water.



WILDFIRE

Call 911 if you see one-- don't assume someone else has called. Listen for evacuation orders and leave right away if you hear them. Tell a family member or friend where you're headed and touch base once there.



#### THUNDERSTORM

Get inside a hardtop auto or a building; shutter windows and secure doors. Avoid showering since pipes and fixtures can conduct electricity. If you're outside, avoid tall trees, open fields, the beach and anything metal.




TORNADO

Go to the basement. If you do not have one, head to a neighbor's or to a storm shelter. Otherwise, put as many walls between you and the outside as you can, avoiding windows and doors. Get under a sturdy table and cover your head.



HURRICANE

Secure outside doors, then inside doors. Go to a small room, closet or hallway on the lowest level. Keep blinds closed and stay away from windows – even if there' a lull, you may be in the hurricane's eye, and winds could pick up again.



#### EARTHQUAKE

Memorize the motto, "Drop, cover and hold on": Drop to your hands and knees (before tremors can knock you down); cover your head and neck by getting under a sturdy table; and hold on until the shaking stops.
